

Drug overdose from opioids—including heroin, OxyContin, morphine, fentanyl, and many other pain killers-- is a significant problem impacting communities throughout New York State.

You can learn how you can help to save another person's life by using a medication that safely reverses opioid overdose—naloxone.

By the end of this **45-min training**, the participant will be able to:

- Define the impact of opioid overdoses on New York State;
- Recognize an opioid overdose;
- List the steps to take when encountering an opioid overdose;
- Assemble the mucosal atomizer used for administering naloxone and get an overdose rescue kit; and
- Recall New York's "911 Good Samaritan" law.
